Foreword

Colonel J. D. Ferguson, C.M.G., D.S.O., A.M.S.(R)

As a former A.D.M.S. of the 47th Division, I have been asked to write the foreword to this Historical Record of the 5th London Field Ambulance which, with the 4th and 6th London Field Ambulances, formed the Field Ambulance Units of this Division.

No literary merit is claimed for this volume. It has been compiled and written solely to meet the wishes of all ranks of the Unit.

They desired to have it not only as a book of reference, but as a record to pass on to those who come after them; not with any boastful intent but with hope that it may help in fostering the Spirit of Remembrance.

It is an attempt to bring together simply and compactly, and in as concise a way as possible the many periods and phases through which the Unit has passed since it was first embodied. It means to suggest that the Past is still alive.

As A.D.M.S. of the 47th London Division from August 1915 to June 1917, I necessarily saw much of the 5th London Field Ambulance. As President of its Old Comrades' Association I still have the pleasure and honour of keeping in touch with it.

The loyalty, devotion to duty and the camaraderie displayed by all ranks helped materially to contribute to the honour of that Division to which we feel so justly proud of having once belonged.

I can write nothing but good of the 5th. They did all that was asked of them and at all times they did it well. Formerly when a guest at their Annual Re-union Dinners, and now as the President of their Old Comrades Association, I have had and still have opportunities of observing them. As in War, so do I find them in Peace.

The flame of true Comradeship burns as brightly now as it ever did. The light of that torch must never grow dim.

In conclusion I would add and remind them that though their War Service is over, other Service is demanded of them.

They must for ever, animated by their traditions and fired by the example of their gallant Comrades who laid down their lives in the Service of their Country, endeavour by all means in their power, that now and in the future the Youth of this Country shall cherish the same ideals. That, actuated by the same spirit they will pass the flaming torch along.

Following in its light they will do their duty and answer whatever call that may be made on them.

If this book shall in any way help in achieving this object, it will more than repay those who have laboured in its production.

Early Days

In 1886 Capt. F. L. Stephenson, Medical Officer of the Kent Rifle Volunteers, was granted permission to form the Woolwich Division of the Volunteer Medical Staff Corps. During the South African War contingents were supplied for Active Service. Later a Company of the Division was formed at Greenwich.

In 1908 Lord Haldane introduced the Territorial Force replacing the Volunteers. The County of London was to supply a Division—The 2nd London, afterwards the 47th—The Divisional Field Ambulances were formed as follows:— The 4th under Lt. Col. F. L. Stephenson, C.B. at Woolwich from the Woolwich Division; The 5th under Lt. Col. C. H. Hartt, V.D. at Greenwich from the Greenwich Co.; The 6th under Lt. Col. E. Lloyd Williams, T.D. at Chelsea from 2nd London Infantry Bgde. Bearer Co.

Head Quarters were established at 159 Greenwich Road and drills performed in the Royal Hospital School. A Regular Officer was posted as Adjutant and a N.C.O. as Sergt. Major. Capt. Inkson, V.C., Capt. Jones and Capt. Langford Lloyd were in turn Adjutants. Staff Sergt. E. Dyer was posted as Sergt. Major. New Head Quarters were built in South Street but were not finished when War broke out.

On Sunday Aug. 3rd, 1914 the Ambulance entrained at Blackheath for Camp on Salisbury Plain. The train was stopped, returned to the station and the troops were detrained and marched back to Head Quarters. Here they were dismissed to await orders.

The following day each man received A.F. E635 Embodiment—Notice to Join—directing him to report at Head Quarters on Aug. 5th.

In accordance with plans The Ranger's House, Blackheath was taken over. This famous Heath subsequently became, what it had been many times previously in history, a huge camp. The next few days were ones of feverish activity occupied with medical examinations, drawing of stores, horses and vehicles, etc. Preparations complete, the Unit under the command of Lieut. Col. E. B. Dowsett marched to the war station at Hatfield, which was reached on the 14th. Here the famous "Red Lion" hostelry became Head Quarters and the Unit was billeted in the houses and buildings in the vicinity. The next four months were busily spent in training both by night and day.

In December, 1914 the Officers of the Unit with the exception of Lieuts. G. Scott and J. E. Sandilands left and the command passed to Lieut. Col. E. Lloyd-Williams, T.D., other Officers being Major N. C. Rutherford, Lieuts. H. M. Calder, S. Clark, J. Macmillan, C. E. Whitehead and Lieut. and Q.M. H. E. B. Ware. A large draft was sent from Chelsea on Nov. 9th to complete establishment. The personnel was now that which was to work together for the next four years. In January of 1915 orders were received to move to St. Albans. Here billeting again took place and a hat factory and a Salvation Army Barracks became temporary homes. Lieut. J. H. Jordan joined the Unit here.

Training proceeded apace and became more intensified. Frequent inspections by higher authorities, entraining exercises and Divisional movements indicated that the time of departure was drawing near. On Saturday, March 13th the Unit left for Southampton and embarked the next day to join the Division, the second Territorial Division to arrive in France, the 46th Division having preceded it by a few days.
