A FOREWORD

"Wherever brave deeds are treasured and told In the tales of the deeds of yore, Like jewels of price in a setting of gold Are the name and the fame he bore."

Nesbit.

THE ALDERSHOT TATTOO has won such an extensive popularity that there is hardly need to commend it to the favour of those who this year will be paying a visit to Rushmoor to enjoy its particular attractions.

In its earlier forms the Aldershot Tattoo was a Military spectacle pure and simple, being indeed an elaboration of the daily ceremony that marks the day's end in every garrison of the British Army. These Tattoos were carried out with flaming torches, bands and guards marching and counter-marching, but from these comparatively simple shows have sprung the wonderful entertainments of the post-war Tattoos in Rushmoor Arena, now attracting spectators from the ends of the earth. They are organized, produced and acted by soldiers, and it has been the aim of the organizers to stage some glowing episode from the rich history of our country, weaving of set purpose into each show some uplifting theme running like a golden thread through each programme. Thus, of recent years, Sacrifice, Chivalry, Valour, etc., have been the themes chosen. This year the *motif* of the Tattoo is Discipline, a quality that has long been identified with our race, and which has enabled us as a nation in times of stress and peril to endure when the limit of endurance has apparently long been reached, and to succeed when success has appeared impossible. This great quality of a voluntarily adopted national and individual discipline depends on something higher and nobler than fear for its maintenance. It is deeply engrained in the very fibre of the people, and plays an important part in their daily lives. It was much in evidence during the Great War, when the people carried on their daily avocations, facing with unflinching courage losses, dangers and difficulties, and enabled the nation to face the grave difficulties of the post-war years.

The national sense of discipline has its foundations in the splendid military discipline introduced into Britain by the Romans, which enabled their Legions to overcome the brave but undisciplined tribes and hold the country in captivity for three hundred years. The sense of discipline thus painfully learned has been gloriously emulated by the people of this country. It was in splendid evidence on the decks of the sinking troopships—Birkenhead and Warren Hastings—on the Atlantic liner Titanic, and in many mining and other industrial disasters. It was the self discipline of Grace Darling that impelled her great and noble work of rescue at sea; and that sent Florence Nightingale on her great mission of mercy to the Crimea. It burns steady and strong among the police, firemen, ambulance men, nurses and doctors, and keeps the toiler to his job, the housewife to her daily task, and the merchant to his desk, while it is the very essence of service in the Royal Navy, the Army and the Royal Air Force.

So, in this year's programme, the *motif* of discipline appears in many of the items; without it the fascinating movements of the massed bands and the evolutions of the cavalry and artillery would be impossible. It is the keynote of the Corunna spectacle, for in that epic military victory it was the unflagging discipline of Crauford's ragged hungry rearguard that saved Moore's retreating British Army from annihilation on the ice-bound passes of the Galician Mountains. In "Memories" the discipline of games is indicated, while in the spectacle "The Romans in Britain" the value of discipline is emphasized in the landing of the Legions and the ultimate defeat of the gallant Boadicea and her brave but undisciplined tribes by the close-knit Roman cohorts. These Romans indeed laid a wonderful foundation on which we as a people

A guard of the 2nd Bn. Scots Guards will enter and take post in front of the flagstaff in the centre of the Arena.

The bugles of three Light Infantry Battalions, who will be in position at the eastern edge of the Arena, will sound "Retreat"; the guard will present arms and the flag will be lowered.

The bugles will then sound the "General Salute," on conclusion

of which the guard will slope arms and march away.

9.42 p.m. Royal Horse Artillery Display 1.

R.H.A. have been the most mobile form of artillery since just prior to the Peninsular War; they carry their gunners mounted, not on the limbers. They have always been the guns of the cavalry since their introduction.


In 1799 an action was fought at Egmont-op-Zee in Holland which is commemorated to the present day wherever the 15th Hussars and the Chestnut Troop ("A" Battery), R.H.A., are quartered together.

The display shows the value of drill at a pace at which a mistake

cannot be "covered up," and often means a crash.

Of necessity such drill is more elastic and so appears much "looser" than the drill of other arms.

The arena is small for the display and even at the strength of twelve guns (instead of eighteen) it has to be carried out at much reduced intervals and distances.

It is carried out in Service Dress uniform, as the drill is that of the present day, and the gun is the existing quick-firing equipment weighing 33 cwt. behind the team.

A fanfare of trumpets will herald the entrance of a brigade of three batteries of the Royal Horse Artillery. They will carry out the following evolutions at the gallop: -Advance in line towards the grand stand, then wheel "to the right by sections" and along left side of arena; wheel into line across the arena; wheel to the left by sections along the far end of the arena; wheel to the left into "line of Battery Columns"; form line to the front; continue advance to the stands; wheel left by batteries into Brigade Column and up right side of arena in the same formation; wheel again into line at far end of arena; advance to within 60 yards of grand stand, halt and come into action, "Action Rear"; detachments, horses and gun teams trot away, reverse and halt behind and facing their guns. One round of brigade fire is fired. "Cease Firing" is ordered, gun teams trot up, followed by detachment horses; guns are limbered up to the front, gunners vaulting on to their horses.





The Massed Pipe Bands enter from the woods to the tune of "Telel-Kebir." They advance to the grand stand and counter-march, breaking into the tune of "Glenderuel Highlanders," and take up post about 90 yards from the centre of the stand.

As the Massed Pipes and Drums enter, two clansmen of circa 1730, with flaming torches, enter from either side of the Arena, and

take up their positions to mark the flanks of the Battalion.

When the Massed Pipes and Drums have counter-marched, the 2nd Bn. The Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders will enter the arena by half battalions and form up between the two clansmen.

The battalion will then advance in Review Order to the tune of

"Highland Laddie," halt and give the Royal or General Salute.

The battalion will then perform the old Manual Bayonet Exercise of 1900, on the completion of which the whole parade will retire to the tune of "Piobaireachd o' Dhomhnuill Dubh."

5. 10.30 p.m. The Retreat to Corunna

Consequent upon the capitulation of Madrid to Napoleon on December 4th, 1808, and upon the collapse of our Spanish Allies, Sir John Moore's army was forced to retreat towards Corunna where he proposed to re-embark his troops. He was hotly pressed, first by

the armies of Napoleon, and then by those of Marshal Soult.

The retreat was carried out in mid-winter by forced marches over mountainous country without regular supplies and with the victorious French harassing our rear and flanks. At first, so urgent was the retreat, that cohesion and order were lost by some units. Later, nearing Corunna, by skilful generalship and the stern discipline of the rearguard, time was gained in which to restore order. Finally, Moore reached the heights before Corunna in advance of the French and there, on January 16th, 1809, he made his historic stand to cover the re-embarkation of his army. The position selected by Moore left the French with the advantage of ground. They already had the advantage in numbers. On the morning of January 16th the two armies were facing each other across the valley near Corunna. Marshal Soult attacked at 2 p.m., and, after a determined struggle, was repulsed with heavy loss. The British thereupon counter-attacked and were pressing the enemy back, when Moore was mortally wounded.



The scene portrayed on the Arena depicts a portion of the retreating column on its way to Corunna. When the enemy are close upon them, Sir John sends a Staff Officer with orders to the rearguard (Crauford's famous Light Brigade) to halt and engage the approaching enemy. As they do so, French infantry appear from the wood on the left of the Arena, followed by French Cavalry. An engagement ensues and the French Cavalry will be seen endeavouring to turn the left flank of the rearguard. This concludes the first phase of the item.

The second phase opens with the voice of Mr. Henry Ainley reciting Wolfe's poem, "The Burial of Sir John Moore." The searchlights now pick up drummers of the Norfolk Regiment carrying the body of the General to the ramparts for burial.

"Not a drum was heard, not a funeral note."

The bells in Corunna chime the hour. The sullen boom of distant enemy guns, firing intermittently, is heard. The body of Sir John is lowered to the grave with the words: "We left him alone with his glory."

It is interesting to note that of the troops taking part in this item, The Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry (then the 32nd Regiment of Foot), The Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders (then the 79th Highlanders) were present with Moore, while drummers of The Norfolk Regiment actually carried Sir John to his grave.

The Massed Bands, Drums and Fifes, and Bugles of 18 battalions will enter from the woods playing "Sambre et Meuse" (Rauski). They will march down the centre of the Arena and halt facing the Grand Stand. The "General Salute" will be played, followed by a selection, "Largo" (Handel).

The whole will then advance in quick time playing "Namur" (Richards), left wheel and counter-march, changing into the slow march "Les Huguenots" (Meyerbeer) as they move across the Arena. Then breaking into the quick march "Old Comrades" (Teike) they will counter-march again, and wheeling retire up the centre and make an exit.



10.53 p.m. Engines of War 7.

This item is divided into two parts:—

Part 1—Old-time Engines of War. Part 2—A Modern Army in Battle.

The mechanization of war is no new thing. Mechanical appliances have been used in war since the earliest times. The artillery, vehicles and equipment of a modern army shown in Part II have developed from the primitive engines, of which types are shown in Part I.

Part 1—Old-time Engines of War



The Ballista (Roman period)

Ancestor of the machine gun, firing a flight of arrows or darts instead of a stream of bullets. Manned by Roman Soldiers. The earlier type of Ballista threw stones only.

Trebuchet (Mediæval period)

An improved type of catapult, used in the Crusades. It threw all kinds of missiles, huge stones, bombs, fireballs, and even dead horses. It derived its power from gravitation of a heavy weight. Manned by a Knight and eight Men-at-Arms.

Petard

One of the earliest devices for the use of gunpowder, intended to

blow a breach in the gate or walls of a fortress.

The above will give in succession a demonstration of their use, and will be seen, together with an Assault Tower (possibly the earliest type of Tank), in action against a Keep and Walls on the right side of the Arena.

The Assault Tower carries cross-bow men and archers on the top, has a drawbridge in the middle for storming walls, and a battering ram below for smashing an opening in the wall.

Then from the left of the Arena enter two engines of a later period:—

The Military Mobile Carriage (1790)

An early form of Mounted Infantry, in which small detachments of riflemen could be moved rapidly to some important point of the battle.

The Rocket Troop, R.H.A.

An artillery weapon in use from about 1813 (Battle of Leipzic) to 1880. A special Troop of the R.H.A. was raised and armed with the new rockets, which were 6-pounders, invented by an ancestor of General Sir Walter Congreve, V.C., K.C.B.


Part 2-A Modern Army in Battle

Sounds of battle are heard, and the rearguard of a retiring force is seen falling back in haste over a bridge. It is seeking to put the river between itself and the pursuing British force, and the engineers of the rearguard can be seen preparing the bridge for demolition. A reconnoitring British aeroplane flies over.

As the leading cavalry scouts of the British Army appear, the bridge is blown up, and those of the rearguard who have been unable to cross are forced to surrender. The cavalry are quickly followed by

the leading infantry with mechanized machine guns. The infantry take over the line of the river bank from the cavalry, who are free to mount again and go off to look for a crossing lower down the river.

Now the river must be bridged as rapidly as possible, to enable the pursuit to continue. First, a body of infantry enters, carrying an infantry assault bridge made of small folding boats, which they launch just above the blown-up bridge. They cross by this and drive back the enemy rearguard, supported by the fire of a battery of mechanized artillery, which has now come into action, and assisted by aeroplanes which drop bombs on the enemy. The R.E. are now able to come up

and throw over bridges of a more solid type, firstly a bridge made of folding boats and next a bridge of steel girders to take the heavier vehicles of the army. They are protected against air attack by anti-aircraft artillery.

Meanwhile, the Commander of the Advanced Guard can be seen sending back messages by a mobile W.T. set and by motor-cycle despatch riders, thus keeping the Commander of the Main Body informed of the progress of events. A motor ambulance is seen collecting the wounded. As soon as the bridges are complete, the infantry, mechanized machine guns and artillery cross the river, assault the position the enemy rearguard has taken up, and continue the pursuit.
