

Please to give her my most kind love when you write her next - I have not heard from my Mother or Brother since January last - I am looking out every Post - and can't think the reason - I must conclude this Scrawl now and remain my dear Cousin

"Bere 29 July 1846

My dear Walter

Thanks for your letter which I have just received. I wish with all my heart we could meet again once more, but the fate is seen against it. I have been married now nearly nine years, & you have never been introduced to my wife - & I think it must be 14 or 15 years since I last set eyes on you. However I won't moralise about the matter but still hope even against hope. Are you not grown old & grey? I am. When you go down to the Westward the old Patriarch of the Island will be much pleased to see you; tho' you will find him a good deal altered; very feeble & forgetful. I hope myself to go down to him for a few days either at the end of next month, or the beginning of September; as I do not think it right to be so long without seeing him - as has been lately the case. We were with him during the month of May last. So you went to the Exhibition & saw my children's effigies. We have not seen the picture since it was finished but were pleased with the likeness - & very much so with the painter, who spent a week with us while engaged about them. About the Carrington pedigree, I fear the Chronicle of our branch of the family perished with poor dear Robert, who is the only one I ever heard speak on the subject, & who once promised to give me some insight into it. There must I think have been a perhaps noware, among his papers some notices of the family. He considered them to come from the branch at Spouton. All I know of them is that our great grandfather lived in London - was I taken a watchmaker of eminence, & an officer of the City Trained Bands. A picture of him in uniform is or was at Topsham, dignified by the title of the "Old General". This puts me in mind that I sent to Robert shortly before his death the pictures by Nixon of our grandfather

& grand mother. I believe he put them into Tucker's hands to be repaired & cleaned. What is become of them? Do you know? Otherwise it may be worth while to enquire when you go into Devonshire. I should be sorry they were lost! Think of it. To return to our Great Grandfather. He married the sister of Bishop Larington: & I think the Chancellor was his only child - at least I never heard any mother speak of any other. He was Rector of Clayworth in Nottinghamshire & came into the West with the Bishop. Whether he had the living of Charing previously to his residing at Clayworth I don't know - but I have heard my mother say he was Curate at Kent. This is the only one of Eustace's list of whom I can give any information. I should be very proud to make out if I could, any claim of kindred to N.T. Carrington, for as a Poet & a man of talents he would do honour to any family. His "Dartmoor" independent of its deep interest to a Devonshire man, is among the sweetest lays four language. The Vicar of Berkeley was the Inventor of a patent medicine in which most probably from sympathy with the name "Carrington's life pills" my poor mother had unbounded confidence. Trusting we shall meet again some day or other & with all our loves, I remain

My dear Lady

Many thanks for your kind letter of the 9<sup>th</sup> and am glad to find that the Honey is arrived safe - I hope it will turn out well. You must not fancy that I meant you should write - I well know your time is a must be taken up - in fact I did not know to whom the news about Eliot came to - and won't I give it to Flora? who must have known all about it - and twice did I dine with her and not a word said about it. I shall be anxiously looking out for Edw<sup>ds</sup> dispatches after his safe arrival - which I hope he is now getting pretty near the Coast. Lord Chandos returned safe & sound yesterday - after more than three months cruise - which he seems to have enjoyed very much - I have caught a cold - which is bothering - but hope will soon run off. Perhaps your mother's intentions may alter when the places are settled - as to selling the property. As to the payment for the Honey - I promise not to arrest you - till due notice after my return to Town. Old Sidrad is getting on - but slowly - I fear he does not walk as far as he ought - he has not reached Quebec yet. What a shame now 23<sup>rd</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> I send some Faushaw names. Marriages & Births. Harriet Woolton has a girl whose name I have not yet been able to get. I suppose Julia is on her return home - much to your satisfaction - Rec'd a nice letter from Lalla - but won't Juba & wee pet - remembrance to Mrs H - Ever dearest lady

\* In consequence of the illness of the Master, Mr. Higgs, & the death of Boyer Glover, a new election was held on March 7<sup>th</sup> 1768. (as appears above.)

on Sep 13<sup>th</sup>, Henry Horne elected Master for the remainder of the year, in the room of Samuel Charrington, deceased.

104. The Court of Assistants was summoned to meet on the 7<sup>th</sup> July 1766, when the Master was admitted The First Liverman.

It appears from p 103, that at this time the Master, Wardens etc of the Clock makers art or mystery had petitioned the Lord Mayor & Aldermen, that they might be made a Livery Company of the City of London. Hence the entry in that which follows, also p. 104 }


