### Order of Teremony

I. Two Troops of Household Cavalry with Band will be formed up on the South side of the Parade facing North.

Eight Guards furnished by the Brigade of Guards, each consisting of 3 Officers and 68 Other Ranks, will be formed up in Column. Nos. 1 to 5 Guards will be on the West side of the Parade facing South, and Nos. 6 to 8 Guards will be on the North side of the Parade facing West.

The Massed Bands and Drums of the Brigade of Guards will be formed in front of the right of the line.

- 2. The King's Colour of the 1st Bn. Welsh Guards will be posted about the centre of the Parade.
- 3. The Guards will be formed into line and the Officers will fall in.  $\,$
- 4. His Majesty, attended by the Royal Procession, will ride on to parade from the Mall and will be received with a Royal Salute.

His Majesty will then inspect the troops.

- 5. The Bands and Drums will play a Slow March from the right to the left of the line, and a Quick March from the left to the right of the line.
- 6. The Escort for the Colour will move out and halt opposite the Colour which will be taken over by the Ensign, the Band playing "God Save the King." The Colour will then be trooped down the line of the Guards.

- 7. Troops will march past His Majesty in Slow and Quick time, and then form up again in line.
  - 8. The Household Cavalry will march off Parade.
- 9. His Majesty will place himself at the Head of the King's Guard and will ride down the Mall to Buckingham Palace, followed by the King's Guard and the other Guards in Column of Divisions.
- 10. On arrival at Buckingham Palace the ceremony of relieving the King's Guard will take place in the Forecourt, and the remaining Guards will march past His Majesty and return to Barracks.
- II. After His Majesty has passed into the Palace, the Massed Bands of the Brigade of Guards will perform a programme of music in the Forecourt of Buckingham Palace.

#### HISTORICAL NOTE.

The Ceremony is strictly speaking a Guard-Mounting Ceremony, and dates from the 18th century when the Battalion finding the Guards for the day trooped the Colour which was to be carried on the King's Guard.

This custom is still kept up during the month of May, when the Battalion for Guard troops its Colour and the King's Guard marches off from the Horse Guards Parade.

These Guard-Mounting Parades are often mistaken for Rehearsals for the King's Birthday Parade, but are really the carrying out of the Old Guard-Mounting Ceremony.

Many years ago it became the custom to find the Public Guards on the King's Birthday from the Flank Companies of the whole Brigade, and it is from this custom that the Ceremony of Trooping the Colour on His Majesty's Birthday originates.
